## RAY NEWTON - HONOURING TRE LEGACY OF A POULTRY ICON



Ray Newton, an esteemed figure within the Lismore Poultry Club, sadly passed away on 25/6/2023, and is remembered for his dedication and profound expertise, leaving an indelible mark on the poultry community. His journey into the world of breeding and showing poultry began at the tender age of 8 , achieving notable success with his "Rhode Island Reds" at the Nimbin Show in 1938. Ten years later in 1948, Ray won his first show at Lismore with Minorca's. Ray often reminisced about his early days, recalling how he would stay with his aunt $\mathcal{\&}$ uncle in South Lismore, showbirds in tow, and would transport them next day by horse and cart to the show.

Over his six-decade involvement with the club, starting in 1960, Ray actively participated in various events, generously sharing his wealth of knowledge with fellow enthusiasts. His expertise in breeding, exhibiting
and judging various breeds, notably Pekin and Langshan Bantams, earned him widespread recognition as a master breeder and judge. Remarkably, Ray's incredible showing career spanned 80 years, culminating in his final show at the Brisbane Ekka in 2018, where he earned the esteemed title of Reserve Champion of Show with his Black Pekin rooster.

Ray's influence extended beyond Lismore as he judged at prestigious shows across the country, from Rockhampton in Queensland to the Royal Brisbane and Royal Sydney Shows, Melbourne, Adelaide, and beyond.

Instrumental in organizing the Lismore Poultry Club's Centenary Show in 2001, Ray, alongside his devoted wife Glenda, also produced the "Centenary Year Book 1901-2001," a comprehensive record of the club's rich history. Their dedication was further demonstrated in 2006 with the Testimonial Poultry Show \& Dinner, highlighting their commitment to preserving the heritage of the poultry community.

Ray served as President of the Lismore Poultry Club from 1980-1989 and 1993-1996. His dedication to service to both the Lismore Poultry Club \& North Coast National was duly recognised with life memberships to both organizations, a testament to his exceptional service and leadership.

Beyond his contributions to the poultry world, Ray was a devoted family man, cherished by his wife Glenda and their three children. Outside of his poultry pursuits, Ray worked diligently as a laborer in his younger years for a flood mitigation company and later as a truck and machinery driver for Lismore City Council, retiring from the latter after 22 years of service.

Ray's passing in June 2023 has left a void within the Lismore Poultry Club and the broader poultry community. Nevertheless, his memory endures through the lasting friendships he forged, the wisdom he freely shared, and the values he instilled in generations of poultry lovers.

In honour of Ray's enduring legacy, the Lismore Poultry Club will commemorate his life and contributions at its 123rd Annual Show on 8th June 2024, named the "Ray Newton Memorial Show," with a special focus on Pekin Bantams. This tribute celebrates Ray's achievements and pays homage to his invaluable mentorship and guidance over the years.

Ray Newton's profound impact on the poultry community will be fondly remembered by all who had the privilege of knowing him. His contributions to the club and his impact on poultry breeding and judging will be remembered with reverence and gratitude for many years to come.

Attendees learned many a new trick and were given the run down on what kinds of tools and products should be in their show kit, such as a Toothbrush for scrubbing legs, nail fileor nail clippers for trimming beaks and toe nails, cod liver oil for rubbing on their legs/face and wattles and a microfibre cloth for rubbing along the feathers to remove any random debris and to help stray feathers fall back into place.

The Pekin is considered a True Bantam and is a Softfeather, Heavy Breed. It has great popularity in Australia, where breeders achieved a high standard of excellence, as well as a diverse array of colours. The history of Peking is disputed, although without doubt, their origin is China and the imperial society of Peking (now known as Beijing). Some accounts suggest that they were 'acquired' by French and British soldiers around 1860, while others claim that birds were on consignment from China around 1835, and initially referred to as "Shanghais," and presented to Queen Victoria. These are the intriguing origins of the breed we now know as Peking.

Pekin males are your typical 'cocky' bantam rooster! Their broad, well-rounded shape is emphasized by a low breast or 'front' and a well-developed 'cushion' tail. Their short, thick legs and abundant foot feather are coupled with a forward tilt stance that completes the 'round ball' appearance of this cheeky and extraverted jewel of softfeather bantams.

Female Peking share many of the same features as the male, allowing for sexual differences, and their 'cushion' feathers are spread to form an appearance not unlike a Chrysanthemum in full bloom. Again, a rounded low appearance with forward tilt is desirable. They make great mothers and are renowned for their tendency to go broody and protect their broods fiercely. They lay a moderate numbers of numbers of eggs but could not be classed as productive egg layers.

Exhibiting Peking demands meticulous grooming due to the abundance of feather, while year-round care, especially for foot feathers, is crucial for maintaining perfection in plumage and cleanliness. On the North Coast we are fortunate to have had, and still have, some exceptional breeders and exhibitors of Peking, the late Ray Newton and Ray Connor are two legends that recently passed, as well as the McKenzie Family of Bungalow that are national authorities on Peking.

Breeding Peking is a rewarding experience but with the abundance of feathering comes challenges. Removal or trimming of vent feathers may be required to 'optimise' fertility, otherwise many breeders use artificial insemination. The choice is yours and breeders and exhibitors are always keen to assist those interested in this bundle of Charisma wrapped in feathers.

Pekin Bantams are prized, not only for their ornamental appeal, but also for their docile nature, making them ideal companions for families, particularly those with young children, when handled regularly.

## EGGSCELLENCE - EXPLORING TME FINE ART OF EGG JUDGING

In this article, we delve into the intricacies of egg judging, shedding light on what truly makes an egg stand out in the competition.

The Australian Poultry Standard serves as our guide, outlining key points for judging, including size, uniformity, texture, and colour. Each egg is scrutinized not only for its external appearance but also for the quality of its yolk and albumen.

From the ideal egg shape, where length surpasses width, to size, though not the sole determining factor, and the oftenforgotten importance of weight, all of which play a crucial role in the judging of eggs.

The Standard mentions a range of weights, with variability between large $\&$ bantam fowls, turkeys, ducks and geese. For example, bantam eggs are judged to the same standardas that of large fowl,
however adhere to the weight limit, ideally not to exceed 42.5 g . Uniformity is paramount, with each egg expected to mirror its counterparts in shape, size, and shell characteristics.

Texture speaks volumes, with smooth, clean shells preferred over blemished or rough ones. Colours vary from traditional brown to exotic shades like blue and olive, each requiring an even distribution for maximum appeal. There are generally separate categories based on the colour of the eggs exhibited.


However, the true test lies within. The Judge will crack open an egg, and sometimes two, in each exhibit, examining its internal quality. From the bright golden hue of the yolk to the translucent sheen $\mathcal{G}$ rise of the albumen, every detail matters. Any deviation, such as meat spots or blood, could spell disaster for an otherwise perfect specimen. Ultimately, it is the combination of external appearance and internal quality that determines the champion eggs in the competition.

Jeff Thompson, a member of our club will be the Judge of the Egg Competition at the upcoming 2024 Brisbane Ekka Show \& was the inspiration for this article.

Entering an egg competition has broad appeal, welcoming breeders of all experience levels, so why not make inquiries with your local club and consider putting an entry in.

## Howard Burnham

It is with sad hearts that we bid farewell to a member of our poultry community, Howard Burnham who passed away on 7th September 2023 , at the age of 86 .

Raised on a dairy farm in Nashua, Howard's love of poultry began from an early age.

From the age of 10 years old,
 Howard, long with his twin
brother Bevan, embarked on their journey in poultry breeding by saving up and buying a couple of Buff Pekins from a local breeder. Their father was not involved in poultry so they had to rely on information soaked up from members of the poultry community who were always happy to provide guidance.As time went on, Howard garnered notoriety for his expertise in breeding Buff Pekins and later with breeding Spangle OEG Bantams.

After years of breeding and showing fowls, Howard built up his knowledge of poultry and both he and Bevan ventured into poultry judging. Howard was widely respected, both as an esteemed poultry judge, and as a skilled breeder of poultry. When he moved into town and had to give up the breeding, the connection with the poultry community was kept alive by being involved in judging. He would often travel locally and interstate for judging, both at large and small poultry shows, enjoying each experience of meeting new people, seeing old friends and viewing some great fowls. He was always happy to talk about chooks \& remembered fondly by many as a great fellow who was always ready for a chat.

Howard's passion for sports remained a constant throughout his life. He showcased his athletic prowess in various endeavors, from cricket, where he was a notable player for the Clues District Cricket Association, to football in Mullumbimby, where his exceptional skills led to a rapid promotion from A Reserve to A Grade within a mere week of trying out. Additionally, Howard was an avid tennis player, engaging in the sport for many years at Alstonville and Lismore, both in tournaments and district competitions. His commitment to hard work was exemplified in his involvement when a proposal was put forward to construct tennis courts at Wollongbar, where he dedicated countless hours to assist in the construction efforts.

One of the proudest moments in Howard's life occurred in 1956 when he was given the opportunity to participate in a historic event-the Olympic Torch relay. His section of the relay took place at Springvale Hill at Nashua, a notoriously steep ascent heading towards Clunes. Holding the Olympic torch aloft $\&$ running at pace was challenging and undoubtedly a monumental feat. He then passed the torch to his brother Bevan to continue the journey along the ridgeline.This marked a precious moment by Howard for his whole life.

His ever present bond with his brother Bevan remained throughout his whole life, albeit when they were travelling somewhere to judge, or when they were just standing around the backyard checking out the fowls. The childhood memories of his children are filled with weekends of being packed into the backseat of the car, surrounded by boxed chooks en route to poultry shows, and spending their days in poultry pavilions as their father showcased his birds, or officiated as a judge.

He was a devoted family man cherished by his loved ones, friends, and neighbours alike. Howard's absence will be deeply felt by all who had the privilege of knowing him.
